## 1. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The Finnish Immigration Service seeks to improve the efficiency and cost-effectiveness of its residence permit processes. This includes calculating to which extent the fees paid by the third-country nationals cover the actual costs of processing applications in the Finnish Immigration Service. In this context, Finland is also reviewing some of its fees.

For comparison, Finland is interested to find out what are the fees paid by third-country nationals (application fees and/or issuance fees) in other EMN Member and Observer Countries, and what is the basis for determining the level of these fees. In Finland, the rationale behind the fees is to cover the costs of processing applications in the Finnish Immigration Service (i.e. cost-relatedness). Finland would be interested to know if similar criteria in determining the fees are applied in other Member or Observer Countries. Also, Finland is interested to know if third-country national children applying for citizenship must pay a fee. In addition, Finland is interested to know the cost of an alien's passport.

This query is a thematic continuation of Poland's recent AHQ 2024.46 on Fees paid by third-country nationals for granting residence permits. Finland is, however, more specifically interested on the rationale behind the fees in addition to the actual amount of the fees, and therefore we would like to elaborate on Poland's recent query.

- 3. Is the level of fees mentioned in Q1 and Q2 related to the actual cost of processing these applications (cost-relatedness). YES/NO. If no, please elaborate.**
- 4. If you answered yes to Q3, to which extent do the revenues from fees mentioned in questions 1 and 2 cover the actual costs of processing these applications, and how do you calculate this?**
- 5. Is there a fee collected from a child applicant applying for citizenship at the same time as his/her parent? YES/NO. If yes, what is the amount?**
- 6. What is the fee collected from third-country nationals for an alien's passport (passport of foreigners) in your Member or Observer Country?**

The most common residence permit is a long-term stay for the purpose of study. The consular fee for adults and children is 2,500 CZK (collected in € according to the Czech National bank exchange rate set on the first day of the month and valid for the entire following calendar month) and the administrative fee is 2,500 CZK (approximately EUR 100) for adults, 1,000 CZK (approximately EUR 40) for children under 15.</p> <p>3. It cannot be determined, the fees collected are a general revenue of the state budget and not of the immigration authorities.</p> <p>4. N/I</p> <p>5. Yes, the administrative fee for an adult applicant is 2000 CZK (approximately EUR 80), for a minor 500 CZK (approximately EUR 20).</p> <p>6. The application fee for the temporary residence permit is 96 EUR*, if it was submitted in Estonia to Estonian Police and Border Guard Board or 125 EUR* if it was submitted at a foreign representation of Estonia. The same fee of 96 EUR* applies for the application of the extension of the residence permit. Ordering a document to a foreign representation will cost 20 EUR in addition to the state fee. Changing the pick-up location of a document will cost 10 EUR but changing the pick-up location from one foreign representation to another will cost 80 EUR. *The state fees will be altered from 1 of January 2025. The application fee for the temporary residence permit for employment will be 250 EUR when submitted in Estonia and 280 EUR when submitted at a foreign representation.</p> <p>2. In Estonia, the most common residence permit issued for educational reasons is the temporary residence permit. The application fee for the temporary residence permit is 64 EUR* if it was submitted in Estonia or 95 EUR* if it was submitted at a foreign representation. The same fee of 64 EUR* applies for the application of the extension of the residence permit. Ordering a document to a foreign representation will cost 20 EUR in addition to the state fee. Changing the pick-up location of a document will cost 10 EUR but changing the pick-up location from one foreign representation to another will cost 80 EUR. *The state fees will be altered from 1 of January 2025. The application fee for the temporary residence permit will be 225 EUR when submitted in Estonia and 255 EUR when submitted at a foreign representation.</p>

Based on the purpose of an act, the benefits received as a result of the act, or material public interest and, above all, based on social or economic policy considerations, the rate of a state fee may be established on different basis than the cost principle. In the recent years, however, the state fees have not been covering all the costs related to the performance of the acts as the fees have not been raised for years. Therefore the fees will be altered from 1 of January.</p> <p>5. No, persons less than 18 years of age are exempt from payment of a state fee for the review of an application for Estonian citizenship (with some detailed exceptions).</p> <p>6. In Estonia, the application fee for an alien's passport is 45 EUR* if it was submitted in Estonia or 70 EUR* if it was submitted at a foreign representation. A state fee of 35 EUR* is paid if said act is applied for via the self-service portal of the Police and Border Guard Board. *The state fees will be altered from 1 of January 2025. The application fee for an alien's passport will be 60 EUR when submitted in Estonia, 90 EUR when submitted at a foreign representation and 50 EUR when applied for via the self-service portal of the Police and Border Guard Board.</p>

In Finland, the most common residence permit issued for employment reasons is the residence permit for an employed person, which requires labour market testing (on the Finnish Immigration Service website “Residence permit for work: work requiring a partial decision”). The application fee for the first residence permit of an employed person is 740 EUR for paper application, and 540 EUR for electronic application. For extended permits, the same application fees apply for all residence permit categories. The fee for paper application is 430 EUR, and for electronic application 170 EUR. In Finland, only application fee applies, there are no separate issuance fees.</p> <p>2. In Finland, the most common residence permit issued for educational reasons is the residence permit for studies (maximum length is the duration of the studies). The application fee for the first residence permit for studies is 450 EUR for paper application, and 350 EUR for electronic application. For extended permits, the same application fees apply for all residence permit categories. The fee for paper application is 430 EUR, and for electronic application 170 EUR. In Finland, only application fee applies, there are no separate issuance fees.</p> <p>3. Yes.</p> <p>4. In Finland, the application fee for an alien's passport is 44 EUR. There is no separate issuance fee. The application fee is paid upon submitting the application, and it is not refunded even if the application is rejected.</p>

The residence permit most commonly issued for reasons of employment in France is the "employee" residence permit (38,325 first "employee" residence permits, under a permanent employment contract, issued in 2023). Since January 1, 2022, the amount paid for the first issue and renewal of an "employee" residence permit has been €225 (€200 tax and €25 stamp duty).</p> <p>2. The residence permit most commonly issued for educational reasons in France is the "student" residence permit (108,375 first "student" residence permits issued in 2023). Since January 1, 2022, the amount paid for the first issue and renewal of a "student" residence permit has been €75 (€50 tax and €25 stamp duty).</p> <p>3. No.</p>

		<p>The purpose of the taxes and stamp duties for issuing residence permits is to cover the cost of their manufacture and delivery, as well as to help finance the running costs of the prefectures and support the integration measures provided free of charge to foreign nationals arriving in France.</p> <p>However, while part of the revenue from stamp duty is paid to the National Agency for Secure Documents (<i>Agence Nationale des Titres Sécurisés, ANTS</i>), which is responsible for supervising the purchase and delivery of residence permits, the tax on residence permits is essentially allocated to the general budget, making it impossible to establish a relation between the actual cost of processing applications and the level of tax.</p> <p>4. n/a</p> <p>5. Yes, in general, a naturalisation application for a minor child costs 55 euros, which corresponds to the tax stamp.</p> <p>6. In France, the travel document for foreign nationals (<i>titre de voyage pour étranger, TVE</i>) allows beneficiaries of international protection (refugees, beneficiaries of subsidiary protection, stateless persons) to travel outside of France. The fee for this permit is <b>40 euros</b> if the third-country national (RPT) has a multi-annual residence permit (4 years), and <b>45 euros</b> if he or she has a residence permit (10 years). This fee corresponds to the cost of the tax stamp. The most common residence permit issued for educational reasons in Germany is the residence permit for further education, including for full-time studies at a state or state-recognized university or a comparable education institution and for preparation for courses of study. The first issuance of these residence permits costs 100 euros. Extending these residence permits for a further stay of up to three months costs 96 euros of fees. Extending these residence permits for a further stay of more than three months costs 93 euros.</p> <p>3. Yes.</p> <p>4. Pursuant to Section 69 (2) of the Residence Act the fees are calculated based on the costs which are eligible, according to business principles, for inclusion in the accounts as indirect and overhead costs, especially personnel and material costs and imputed costs. Section 69 (5) of the Residence Act stipulates that the fees which are fixed in a statutory instrument (in this case the Ordinance Governing Residence) may not exceed certain maximum rates. The costs of a legal reform (including the costs for processing applications for residence permits) are included in the draft legislation. In order to calculate the costs, usually the average amount of hours needed to process a case is multiplied by the average wage per hour worked on that case. Hence, the costs of an average case should be covered by the fees. However, as each application requires a different amount of processing time, due to the complexity of the case, the fees may cover the actual costs totally or partially or might occasionally be higher than the actual costs.</p>

The level of the above fees was readjusted in order to comply with the principle of proportionality provided in european legislation.
