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BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Spain has recently revised and updated its legal framework governing the general immigration regime. However, certain specific categories - such as the authorisation of stay for study purposes granted to third-country national minors (pupils) - remain subject to separate, specific regulation, given their particular relevance in safeguarding the best interests of the child and the inherent difficulty of addressing them comprehensively within a broad legislative instrument such as the general immigration regulations. This is further compounded by the need for a detailed legal and administrative assessment tailored to their specific circumstances.

Currently, this category is not specifically regulated by the immigration law, and such authorisation may only be granted to minors who participate in an officially recognised mobility programme.

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One of the main objectives of regulating this type of authorisation is to establish a clearer, more coherent and efficient system that specifically defines the conditions and procedures applicable to this group, while ensuring the protection of the best interests of the child and safeguarding legal certainty for both families and the educational institutions involved.

Whitin this context, the Ministry of Inclusion, Social Security and Migration seeks to gather information on the legislation and current practices in other Member States regarding the issuance of visas and authorisations of stay for study purposes granted to minors (pupils). This includes aspects such as eligibility criteria, procedural requirements, duration, associated rights, possible limitations, and, in particular, any specific features of these authorisations that provide enhanced legal safeguards.

This regulatory project is being processed with the utmost urgency, given the pressing need to establish a clear and effective legal framework enabling minors to come to Spain for study purposes. During the third week of September, contributions on the draft will be received from social partners and the relevant ministries. It is therefore essential to receive timely input to ensure that the resulting regulations are both comprehensive and operational within the required timeframe.

If you answer YES to Q1, what is the minimum age required to be eligible for applying for such authorisation of stay or residence permit?</p> <p>In Austria, the Settlement and Residence Act does not specify a minimum age, but the purpose of residence specified in Art. 63 Settlement and Residence Act for a "Residence Permit – Pupil" stipulates that the applicant must at least be of school age (within the meaning of the Compulsory Education Act). Source: Ministry of the Interior</p> <p>3. If you answer YES to Q.1, what type of documentation must be provided by parents or the person holding legal guardianship to authorise the pupil to immigrate to your Member State?</p> <p>In Austria, according to Art. 8 subpara. 7 lit. b Regulation on the Implementation of the Settlement and Residence Act, proof of care and upbringing of minor pupils by an adult natural person residing in Austria is required.</p> <p>4. If you answer YES to Q1, does the education institution or a third party has to be responsible for the minor during their stay or residence in the Member State? YES/NO. If yes, please explain.</p> <p>Yes. Responsibility must be assigned to a third party. Source: Ministry of the Interior</p> <p>5. 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			<p>See Q3. Proof that the pupil is being cared for and educated by an adult natural person residing in Austria must be submitted by the applicant (pupil) together with the evidence of general and specific eligibility requirements (Art. 63 Residence and Settlement Act) when applying for an Residence Permit – Pupil. A declaration of liability is permissible. Source: Ministry of the Interior</p> <p>6. Is there any form of validation or verification carried out by the Member State on the individual or institution that is going to be responsible for the pupil? YES/NO. Please explain. Currently, individuals or institutions are only subject to review in justified individual cases. Source: Ministry of the Interior</p>
	<p>EMN NCP Belgium</p>	<p>Yes</p>	<p>1. Does your Member State allow the entry and stay of third-country nationals minor who are not accompanied by their parents or legal guardians, hereinafter referred to as “pupils”, for the purpose of pursuing studies? YES/NO.</p> <p>Yes. Age is not a condition to apply for a residence permit for the purpose of pursuing studies. However, the legislation foresees that these studies must be conducted in a higher education establishment, or a preparatory year for this education. With the exception of student exchange programs, the legislation does not foresee the issuance of residence permits to pursue secondary education (see below). Therefore, applicants who are under the age of 18 are still considered to be students, not “pupils”.</p> <p>If a minor foreign national wishes to study at a secondary school, they can appeal to the discretionary authority of the minister or their representative. There is no legal basis for this, and applications are handled on a case-by-case basis. The bar is set very high, however, as</p>

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the foreign national will have to prove a connection to Belgium, prove that the studies cannot be conducted in the country of origin, provide parental consent, provide official proof that someone in Belgium can represent the minor's interests, prove their solvency, enroll in a school, etc. In practice, the Immigration Office receives very few applications for secondary education.

There is no minimum age requirement (see answer to Q1).

3. If you answer YES to Q.1, what type of documentation must be provided by parents or the person holding legal guardianship to authorise the pupil to immigrate to your Member State?

Article 60 §3 4° of the Immigration Act specifies that if the third-country national is under 18 years old, their visa application must include an authorisation from their parents or their legal guardian.

If you answer YES to Q1, does the education institution or a third party has to be responsible for the minor during their stay or residence in the Member State? YES/NO. If yes, please explain.</p> <p>No. Students (even if under the age of 18) must submit proof that they fulfil all the conditions of their residence permit, including: proof that they will have sufficient means of subsistence for the duration of their stay, so as not to become a burden on Belgium's social assistance system during their stay (Article 60 §3 5° of the Immigration Act); proof that they have or will have health insurance covering all risks in Belgium for the duration of their stay (Article 60 §3 6° of the Immigration Act).</p> <p>The proof of sufficient means of subsistence can be fulfilled by having a commitment from a third party to bear the costs of health care, accommodation, studies and repatriation of the dependent third country national for the duration of the planned stay, extended by twelve months (Article 61 §1 2° of the Immigration Act). However, this is not specific to minors, and applies to all prospect third-country national students.</p> <p>Source: Immigration Act and website of the Immigration Office (https://dofi.ibz.be/en/themes/third-country-nationals/study/initial-authorisation-stay-application-visa-d-authorisation).</p>
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5. What requirements (e.g. honorability, family links) must be met by the person assuming responsibility for the minor in your Member State?

This is not specific to minors (see answer to Q4), but the person assuming responsibility for a third-country national student must fulfil the following conditions:

- Be a Belgian national; or an EU national with a residence permit of more than 3 months in Belgium or in another EU Member State; or a third-country national with a residence permit of unlimited duration in Belgium or in another EU Member State; or a family member (up to the third degree included (this parental link must be documented)) (Article 61 §1 2° of the Immigration Act);
- Be at least 18 years old or be emancipated (Article 100 §2 1° of the Royal Decree of 08/10/1981);
- Have regular and sufficient means of subsistence for themselves, for each dependent person and for each dependent third-country national. These means must be at least equal to 120% of the amount of the social integration income granted to a person living with a dependent family, i.e. 2.131,28€ net/month. To this amount is added the minimum amount that each dependent third-country national must have, namely 835€ net/month (for the 2025-2026 academic year).

Please note that this is only one of the ways to prove sufficient means of subsistence for the purpose of studies.

6. Is there any form of validation or verification carried out by the Member State on the individual or institution that is going to be responsible for the pupil? YES/NO. Please explain.

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			<p>Yes. This is not specific to minors (see answer to Q4), but the Immigration Office checks that the person assuming responsibility for a third-country national student fulfils the conditions of their formal obligation to bear the costs of health care, accommodation, studies and repatriation of the dependent third-country national for the duration of the planned stay, extended by twelve months.</p> <p>When they present themselves for the legalisation of their signature to the municipal administration for their place of residence in Belgium or, if they reside abroad, to the Belgian diplomatic or consular post competent for their place of residence, the guarantor must present the following documents (Article 100 §3 of the Royal Decree of 08/10/1981):</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">- a formal obligation in accordance with Annex 32 of the Royal Decree of 08/10/1981 and that has been completed, dated and signed;- if they are performing activity as an employee: minimum 3 recent pay slips and their employment contract or an employer's certificate clarifying the type and effective duration of the employment contract, where the employment contract must be valid either for at least one academic year or the intended duration of the studies or for 12 months;- if they are performing activity as a self-employed person: a document, drawn up by a public administration, showing their monthly or annual net/gross income, proof of payment of social security contributions, as well as registration with the Crossroads Bank for Enterprises;- if they reside abroad and cannot produce foreign documents equivalent to those mentioned above: any other document, prepared by a public administration, showing the amount of their income. <p>The assessment of these means of subsistence (Article 100 §3 of the Royal Decree of 08/10/1981):</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">takes into account their nature and regularity;does not take into account resources from supplementary assistance schemes, namely integration income and guaranteed family benefits, nor financial social assistance and family allowances;
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			<p>does not take into account unemployment, professional integration, and transition benefits.</p> <p>The formal obligation will be accepted only if the guarantor meets all these conditions. Does your Member State allow the entry and stay of third-country nationals minor who are not accompanied by their parents or legal guardians, hereinafter referred to as “pupils”, for the purpose of pursuing studies? YES/NO.</p> <p>According to the Law on Foreigners in the Republic of Bulgaria, permission for prolonged residence up to one year may be obtained by foreigners who hold long-stay visa and are students admitted for training in the secondary level of education within the framework of a student exchange programme.</p> <p>The Migration Directorate has no practice on this legal basis for obtaining a right of residence.</p> <p>2. If you answer YES to Q1, what is the minimum age required to be eligible for applying for such authorisation of stay or residence permit?</p> <p>N/A</p>

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			<p>3. If you answer YES to Q.1, what type of documentation must be provided by parents or the person holding legal guardianship to authorise the pupil to immigrate to your Member State?</p> <p>According to the Law on Foreigners in the Republic of Bulgaria, application for obtaining a permit shall be submitted to the Migration Directorate or to the Migration Department / Sector / Group at the Regional Directorates of the Ministry of Interior. The foreigner shall attach to the application:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. a copy of a regular passport or a document substituting it with the pages of the photo, the personal data, long-stay visa, when such is required, and the seal for the last entry into the country; to verify the authenticity of the copy, the original of the passport or the document substituting it shall also be presented;2. certificate for admission on the territory of the country for training in the secondary level of education;3. evidence for participation in a student exchange programme;4. documents, issued by the organisation for student exchange, guaranteeing coverage of its expenses for living, training, health and return;5. documents certifying the admission of the student for the entire term of his stay by a family, meeting the determined conditions and selected in accordance with the rules of the student exchange programme in which he participates, or in a special site for accommodation within the educational institution;6. a notarised declaration of consent of the parents or guardians or trustees. <p>4. 	<p>EMN NCP Croatia</p>	<p>Yes</p>	<p>1. Does your Member State allow the entry and stay of third-country nationals minor who are not accompanied by their parents or legal guardians, hereinafter referred to as “pupils”, for the purpose of pursuing studies? YES/NO.</p> <p>Yes. According to Croatian Aliens Act, temporary residence for the purpose of secondary education will be granted to a third-country national who is not older than 18 years when he enrolls in the final year of education and he have to meet the other conditions prescribed by law.</p> <p>2. If you answer YES to Q1, what is the minimum age required to be eligible for applying for such authorisation of stay or residence permit?</p> <p>The minimum age is not prescribed by law, but a person must be old enough to enroll/attend high school in Croatia. In practice, that can be around 14 years of age.</p>

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3. If you answer YES to Q.1, what type of documentation must be provided by parents or the person holding legal guardianship to authorise the pupil to immigrate to your Member State?


Along with the application for temporary residence, in addition to other documentation, it is necessary to attach the consent of a parent or guardian for the planned residence of minor for the purpose of secondary education in the Republic of Croatia.

4. If you answer YES to Q1, does the education institution or a third party has to be responsible for the minor during their stay or residence in the Member State? YES/NO. If yes, please explain.

Yes, when a temporary residence permit for the purpose of secondary education is requested on the basis of a student exchange the educational institution or organization conducting a student exchange program must provide proof that it assumes responsibility for a third-country national during their stay in the Republic of Croatia, particularly regarding tuition fees. Additionally, educational institution or organization conducting a student exchange program has to provide evidence that the third-country national will have accommodation arranged during their stay, either with a family, in lodging facilities within the educational institution, or, if provided for by special regulations, in another selected location that complies with the rules of the student exchange program or educational project in which the third-country national is participating.

When a temporary residence permit for the purpose of secondary education is based on the consent of the ministry responsible for science and education, the application must be accompanied by the consent of the parents or guardian, as well as information about the person who will take care of the minor while attending the secondary school institution in the Republic of Croatia.

What requirements (e.g. honorability, family links) must be met by the person assuming responsibility for the minor in your Member State?</p> <p>The conditions for guardianship are not stipulated by the Aliens Act, but are guided by the general conditions prescribed by the Family Act.</p> <p>6. Is there any form of validation or verification carried out by the Member State on the individual or institution that is going to be responsible for the pupil? YES/NO. Please explain.</p> <p>During the examination of requests, police officers conduct an official check, which also includes field checks during which data is verified and, if necessary, information is collected from individuals related to the specific case. Additionally, immigration officers have discretion to invite applicants to provide additional supporting information whenever it is necessary for the comprehensive examination of the case. This is allowed when new facts arise, when inconsistencies are detected, or when the available evidence is insufficient to determine all relevant circumstances.</p>

YES/NO.</p> <p>Yes, according to the current legislation, third-country nationals who wish to enter the Republic of Cyprus as 'school pupils' for the purpose of pursuing studies must have a guardian in the Country. The educational institution hosting the students appoints a legal guardian for the children, who is responsible for their care in Cyprus, as well as for communication with the</p>


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			<p>child's family abroad.</p> <p>2. If you answer YES to Q1, what is the minimum age required to be eligible for applying for such authorisation of stay or residence permit?</p> <p>According to the current legislation, minimum age required to be eligible for applying for such authorisation of stay or residence permit is twelve years old.</p> <p>3. If you answer YES to Q.1, what type of documentation must be provided by parents or the person holding legal guardianship to authorise the pupil to immigrate to your Member State?</p> <p>The following documentation must be provided: A valid travel document with a period of validity covering at least the duration of the intended stay of the third-country national, or with a validity period of at least two years from the date of submission of the application; Parental consent or an equivalent document for the intended period of stay, in the case where the third-country national is a minor. The third-country national may not be younger than twelve (12) years of age nor older than nineteen (19) years of age; Proof that the third-country national is covered by health insurance valid for the duration of the intended stay, covering all risks normally covered under insurance policies for citizens of the Republic; Proof demonstrating that, for the duration of the intended stay, the third-country national will have sufficient resources to cover his or her living expenses without recourse to the social welfare system of the Republic, as well as to cover the cost of return travel. The assessment of sufficient resources shall be based on an individual examination of each case and shall take into account resources deriving, inter alia, from a grant, scholarship, or financial commitment by an organisation managing a student exchange programme. The minimum amount of monthly resources required for the purposes of this paragraph shall be determined by order of the Minister of Labour, Welfare and Social Insurance, published in the Official Gazette of the Republic; Proof demonstrating that the third-country national has been</p>

What requirements (e.g. honorability, family links) must be met by the person assuming responsibility for the minor in your Member State?</p> <p>According to Cypriot law, the assumption of guardianship of a child coming to the Republic of Cyprus to attend secondary education schools requires the fulfillment of specific legal conditions. These procedures are strictly in order to ensure the welfare and protection of school pupils. Conditions for assuming guardianship are as follows:</p> <p>Legal procedure through the Court: Guardianship is assigned by a Court decision, which</p>
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			<p>examines the suitability of the applicant and the welfare of the child. Application by the Educational Institution: The application for an entry permit to the Republic of Cyprus is submitted by the educational institution where the child is going to study. The institution must be licensed/ accredited by the Republic of Cyprus or participate in a student exchange or educational program. Residence and Accommodation in Cyprus: The applicant guardian must provide proof of residence in Cyprus, such as utility bills, to ensure that the child will live in appropriate housing conditions. Compliance with School Regulations: The guardian is responsible for adhering to the school regulations and cooperating with the school for the welfare of the child. They must monitor the student’s progress and inform the school of any issues affecting the child’s attendance or behavior. Special Cases: In cases where the child is under the protection or supervision of the Social Welfare Services or is an orphan, the procedures may differ, requiring special consideration by the competent authorities.</p> <p>6. Please explain.</p> <p>Yes, Guardianship is assigned by a Court decision, which examines the suitability of the applicant and the welfare of the child.</p>

Does your Member State allow the entry and stay of third-country nationals minor who are not accompanied by their parents or legal guardians, hereinafter referred to as “pupils”, for the purpose of pursuing studies? YES/NO.</p> <p>YES. The Czech Republic allows minors who are students to enter and legally reside in the country for the purpose of studying, even if they are not accompanied by their parents or legal</p>


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			<p>guardians. Such minors may apply from abroad for a long-term residence permit for the purpose of studying. This concerns secondary education and higher vocational education in fields of study at secondary schools, conservatories, or higher vocational schools registered in the register of schools and educational institutions, which is carried out as part of an exchange program at a domestic host organization.</p> <p>If it is not the case of an exchange program, it is also possible to apply for a general long-term residence. The application can be submitted to a Czech embassy abroad, eventually in the territory of the Czech Republic to the Ministry of the Interior if the minor foreigner holds a visa for a stay of more than 90 days or a long-term residence permit issued for another purpose.</p> <p>2. If you answer YES to Q1, what is the minimum age required to be eligible for applying for such authorisation of stay or residence permit?</p> <p>There is no minimum age requirement. According to the Act on the Residence of Foreign Nationals in the Czech Republic, foreign minors aged 15 and over acquire legal competency (Section 178 of the Act on the Residence of Foreign Nationals in the Czech Republic: "For the purposes of this Act, a foreigner over the age of 15 who is capable of expressing their will and acting independently shall be considered to have legal competency").</p> <p>3. If you answer YES to Q.1, what type of documentation must be provided by parents or the person holding legal guardianship to authorise the pupil to immigrate to your Member State?</p> <p>A minor foreign national who is not accompanied by his or her parents or legal guardians must submit the consent of his or her parents or other legal guardians for his or her stay in the territory. This obligation applies to foreign nationals until they reach the age of 18. The</p>
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			<p>parent's signature on the consent form does not need to be officially certified. There is no prescribed form for this document.</p> <p>In addition to the application form and parental consent, the minor foreign national must submit a travel document, proof of accommodation, financial resources, and a full health insurance certificate. He/she must also provide confirmation from the relevant school of his/her studies or acceptance for study. In the case of a long-term residence for the purpose of study, it must be stated that this study is being carried out as part of an exchange program. In certain cases, proof of non-infectiousness or a document similar to an extract from the criminal record may also be requested upon request.</p> <p>4. If yes, please explain.</p> <p>YES, the responsibility will be with the secondary school, higher vocational school, or conservatory that issued the exchange program document. The basic condition is that this school must be registered in the register of schools and educational institutions, and the Ministry of the Interior verifies this fact.</p> <p>If it is not an exchange program but a general long-term stay, both parents or legal guardians must authorize the person responsible for the stay of the minor foreigner. The Ministry of the Interior will then verify the responsible person (before issuing a residence permit) based on the specific conditions of the case (interview, residence check, etc.).</p> <p>5. What requirements (e.g. honorability, family links) must be met by the person assuming responsibility for the minor in your Member State?</p> <p>Please see Q 4.</p>

YES, the educational institution acts as recognised sponsor and by law has a duty of care for their third-country national students. This constitutes for example that they inform students about relevant legislation in the Netherlands. Additional guidelines for educational institutions are laid out in the Code of Conduct International Student in Dutch Higher Education, which is a joint initiatives of the Dutch government and higher educational institutions. This Code of Conduct does not contain specific provisions for minor students. There are several ways in which the education institution fulfils their duty of care for their third-country national students. For example, the educational institution may assist students with municipal registration, obtaining a citizen service number (BSN), opening bank accounts, finding housing and supporting those who need help with their mental or physical health. Furthermore, every international student has a student coach from their study program. The international student can discuss important matters with this student coach, such as study progress, personal development, and special circumstances. In special circumstances where international students need extra help, the first signs can be picked up by teachers or the mentor. Based on these signs, the student counsellor is called in, who works with the international student to determine what is needed. Depending on the issue, the international student is referred to the student psychologist or the student counsellor helps the student find the necessary assistance. There is a crisis protocol that includes support for international students with acute mental health needs. In the case of international students with serious problems, the parents are almost always involved.[1]
